Introduction

In modern knowledge societies, universities play an increasingly important role in achieving economic growth and social progress. Their traditional missions of teaching and research are being broadened to include Third Mission activities that facilitate their engagement with society and industry.

While the teaching and research missions of the university are well understood and frequently measured, its Third Mission is yet to be fully examined, and approaches to its measurement developed. The E3M Project conference will discuss issues related to measuring the Third Mission, will provide an opportunity to present a set of indicators developed by the project, and to share good practices in attempts to develop a European-wide measurement framework for Third Mission activities.

Aims of the conference

The main aims of the conference are:

- To raise awareness of Third Mission activities and provision in Europe.
- To discuss the importance of measuring Third Mission activities.
- To exchange good practices among third mission providers.
- To present and discuss a *Green Paper* on Third Mission policy recommendations.
- To disseminate the results of the E3M research project.

About E3M

E3M is a three years project co-funded by the European Commission under its Lifelong Learning Programme (Project No: 143352-LLP -1-2008-1-ES-KA1-KA1SCR) and developed by eight partners from seven European countries. The aim of the project is to generate a comprehensive instrument to identify, measure, and compare the Third Mission activities of HEIs from a wide perspective. This is to be achieved by creating indicators for Third Mission activities and by formulating a new approach to measuring methodologies.

Background and overview

There is a growing recognition around the world of the role that universities can play in economic growth and social development in the modern "knowledge society" as outlined by the Lisbon Strategy. University activities have traditionally been understood as two missions: teaching and research. However, more recently policy makers have been keen to encourage all the other contributions of universities to society and to the economy: their Third Mission.

While several ranking systems exist for the First and Second Missions, the Third Mission lacks any cohesive methodology. The E3M Project aims to address this gap. Firstly, a set of standard indicators for three dimensions of the Third Mission, that project partners believed to be indicative of the Third Mission as a whole, were developed. These dimensions are Continuing Education, Technology Transfer & Innovation, and Social Engagement. Secondly, a measuring methodology was to be proposed to assess the performance of European Third Mission providers, benchmarking excellent practices, and help to create a common European area among higher education institutions where Third mission 'tools' could be tested. These tools will be built into a web-based platform to provide access for project stakeholders, together with a range of case studies of providers evaluated as meeting good Third Mission practice standards.

The E3M project involved several leading European higher education networks to ensure a broad and sustainable dissemination of the project's outputs. The outputs from the project should enable Third Mission providers to assess their own performance, share best practices and build relationships with other European Third Mission providers. This should lead to more effective and efficient services being provided to society and to industry as institutions seek to improve their standards, improving the quality of their lifelong learning provision and other related services.
